

## RE Reflections

Our 1<sup>st</sup>-3<sup>rd</sup> graders recently polled individuals to identify the different religions in which our current UU members were raised. A review of the sticky note poster in Classroom #1 will reveal that we have more former Catholics and Methodists than any other denomination. I’m grateful for all the born-again Unitarian Universalists with whom I worship, as their enthusiasm for the search for meaning is contagious and brings joy to my Sundays. Their reflections on what they may consider to be their religious baggage may help lead me to religious epiphany, and I appreciate that.

UUism is woefully under represented on that poster – four people were at home in UU congregations growing up. How would our congregation be different if a majority of members were raised in the UU faith, rather than coming to us as adults? The Wilmington-area community would most certainly be different, as the increased numbers of UUs would raise our congregation’s visibility, secure a stable future and increase our impact on social justice issues. This is not an issue unique to our congregation, but one for our denomination.

Our recently revised website now carries the address of “UUCWNC” instead of just “UUCW” and Rev. Cheryl is trying to get us into the habit of using UUCWNC in any type of communication. Including “NC” eliminates any possible confusion with other congregations with similar acronyms. But! I’m an optimist, so I also like to think that it prepares us for meeting our potential for enlarging the circle of positive impact that our church and denomination has on our local and broader society. The likelihood of this happening increases with each generation of UUs that we produce.

As your Director of Religious Education, I take very seriously my responsibility to provide parents with resources that can be used to help raise the next generation of Unitarian Universalists. I didn’t realize the number and quality of the resources offered by the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) until I became your DRE. My future Beacon columns will include a Parent Resource of the Month, and starting in April, at least one resource for *adult* religious education, as well.

## Unitarian Universalist Association President to Visit UUCWNC on March the 17<sup>th</sup>!



UUA President The Reverend Susan Frederick-Gray will honor us with a visit to our congregation on March the 17<sup>th</sup>; preaching at both the 9:30 and the 11:00 service.

She is the ninth president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and the first woman elected to that position. She was elected in June 2017 to a six-year term after serving congregations in Phoenix, Arizona; Youngstown, Ohio; and Nashville, Tennessee. She lives with her husband, the Rev. Brian Frederick-Gray, and their son in Cambridge, MA.

In her article, “Love the Hell Out of this World” that appeared in the Winter 2018 issue of the online version of UU World, Frederick-Gray wrote: If we are not acting fearlessly for human dignity, compassion, justice, and peace, then we are failing to live our mission.” <https://www.uuworld.org/articles/love-hell-out>

A gifted preacher and a visionary leader, President Frederic-Gray has energized the UUA by challenging the Association to plan and grow for impactful Unitarian Universalist leadership through:

- Equipping Congregations for health and vitality

## UUCWNC Social Justice Advisory Group

The UUCWNC Social Justice Advisory Group held its first meeting in January focused on the work of creating a justice seeking congregation. The group's mission will be to plan and prioritize UUCW social justice work, build and nurture community partnerships, and engage the congregation through education, volunteer recruitment, and leadership development initiatives. Its role will be to facilitate our congregation's social justice endeavors.

UUCWNC Social Justice efforts to date focus on three important issues: racial justice, economic justice and voting rights advocacy. Examples of actions that support these foci include, but are not limited to: MLK march, attendance at NAACP breakfast and meetings, HK March on J (Historic Thousands Jones St March), Souls to the Polls and voter education and registration, and cash bail coalition efforts. In addition, members of the congregation represent UUCWNC in serving the community through work with Mother Hubbard's Cupboard, Support the Port and Family Promise (homeless initiative).

The SJ advisory group will be studying social justice efforts in the larger UU community, discovering more about our congregation's passion and expertise in social justice work and learning about the community through existing community assessments and interviews. These efforts will help inform future actions.

Several emerging initiatives include:

- Reaffirmation of the welcoming congregation process (ensuring we are a faith community that strives for inclusion of LGBTQ members)
- Seeking to end the predatory cash bail system in our county and state (In partnership with the Progressive Book Club)
- Supporting the You Can Vote community forum
- Confronting white supremacy through establishing an adult common read of White Fragility and discussion group

The group welcomes hearing about the social justice passions and concerns of the congregation members as it establishes its path forward.

## Tax Season – YUCK!

This is the tax season, as if we need to be reminded. Many are wondering how the new tax law will affect us personally as we wrestle completing our tax returns due this April 15<sup>th</sup>. With the new higher standard deduction, it is estimated that 9 out of 10 filers who itemized deductions in the past will not itemize in the future. A lot of Churches and Charitable Organizations have been concerned with the possible negative effect the higher standard deduction will have on donors who will no longer be able to deduct their contributions. Time will tell but we don't think this will affect the generous spirit of our congregation.



Our Treasurer John Grigsby and your Finance Committee (on which I have been a member for over four years now) want to take this opportunity to pass along a beneficial tax reminder that will help some of us lower our tax burden.

If you are 70½ or older, as I will become this year, you can make a Qualified Charitable Contribution to the UUCW from your IRA and not have to pay income tax on your withdrawal. This is not a new provision in the law but many have not taken advantage of this savings. All of us with IRAs that are 70½ or older must take a mandatory disbursement (RMD) no later than April 1 of the following year we reach that age. The disbursement is taxed as regular income, at your highest marginal rate.

The requirements are relatively simple. The charitable distribution must be:

- From a traditional IRA or a Roth IRA;
- Direct from the IRA trustee to the charitable organization—with no intervening possession or ownership by the IRA owner;
- On or after the IRA owner has reached age 70½; and
- A contribution to an organization that would qualify as a charitable organization under Sec. 170(b)(1)(a). UUCW qualifies.

So, in general, if you are 70½, have an IRA, and contribute to the UUCW, you are throwing money away if you don't take advantage of this provision of the law. We encourage you to seek advice from your financial advisor or tax accountant on how this applies to your individual situation. John Grigsby or any member of the Finance Committee will be happy to assist you and answer your questions if we can. Good luck on your taxes.

The nomination process is easy. Just follow the simple steps below:


1. Pick up a Nomination Form from the bulletin board on the back wall in Dobkin Hall.
