They deal in large part with issues of policy and how it impacts communications with the congregation and its many self-directed committees that do the footwork of any faith community. We strive to be sensitive to how the vision of the church is being realized and how we can accommodate it in actual ways. Sounds lofty? It sometimes is. Some of our time is spent brainstorming and at other times it's dotting i's and crossing t's. What we hope to accomplish is to be able to present a message that The State of The Church is good. Our financial position is favorable, we have an honored presence in the larger community, we have expanded membership and we continue to attract newcomers. Do we have challenges? A Note from your Faith Formation Director

...in which she daydreams about being the UUA Ware Lecturer or writing the Ware lecture or, okay, just actually listening to the Ware lecture.

I recently learned that this year's Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) General Assembly's keynote speaker will be Naomi Klein – a journalist, author and teacher whom I have read and greatly admire. It made me wonder who past speakers were – who were UU's of the past reaching out to for inspiration?

So down the rabbit hole I went! The Ware Lecture started in 1922 and is what past UUA President William Sinkford described as a “UU outsider telling us what we ought to be paying attention to”. Martin Luther King, Jr., Kurt Vonnegut, Norman Lear, Elaine Pagels, Mary Oliver, Van Jones and Cornel West were all Ware Lecturers at UUA General Assemblies gone by.

Looking at the list of previous lecturers, it's easy to see that the UUA is keeping up with the times, remaining relevant in a constantly changing world. I'm proud that the organization supporting my chosen faith consistently selects keynote speakers who are known not just for their passionate causes, but for their ability to persuade and lead people to action for a more just and peaceful world, and clearly supporting our eight principles.

Naomi Klein's recent writings have focused on global climate change and the inevitable inequities that will become our harsh reality as we, as a People, come to deal with it. We're already seeing 'Disaster Capitalism' (Puerto Rico as an example) as corporations, governments and individuals profit from natural disasters at the expense of its less powerful, voiceless victims. I've already written one Beacon column this year focused on global warming, so I guess I'm on the UUA trend – though I'd rather not be in this case.

If you're unable to attend this year's General Assembly in Providence, RI, June 24-28 check out the uua.org website. They post almost-live updates on the activities, speeches and decisions made during this annual conference. You will be inspired by witnessing our UU principles turned into immediate action with conviction!

Our congregation is a very generous one. Members freely give of their time both for activities within the church and within our larger communities. We celebrate that.

Over the past few months the Generous Life Team has been cataloguing some of the various work groups and volunteer efforts of the congregation. We’ve been overwhelmed (and overjoyed) to see how many of our members and friends are deeply involved in our worship services, in the maintenance and beautification of our facility, in our service for members and for community groups, and in our entertainment and social connection groups. It’s as if generosity is a natural process – like breathing out – that many of us do without restraint. We belong; we care; we open our hearts to others. It’s who we are. It’s what we do.

What some of us may struggle with is the gratitude side of the equation – the breathing in part of the cycle in Tara Brach’s description. We give so naturally we come to see it as part of our identity: We are the givers rather than the receivers.

However, if we are to be balanced as healthy humans, we must also be open to receiving gratitude. We must be willing to let in others’ appreciations for what we bring and avoid the “Oh, it’s nothing.” or “Well, I know others do a lot more.”

Receiving gratitude for our offerings – however small they may seem to us – is important for us and for those who appreciate us. It signals those thanking us that they have been heard and the compliment has been acknowledged.

And beyond the simple interaction of being thanked is the feeling of “being touched by the goodness in others and in our world”. Perhaps in no other time in our country’s history is the recognition and acknowledgment of goodness so important and so necessary for our mental, physical, and social health.

Hear us when we say, thank you for all you do.

It’s been gratifying to experience the *Power of We* at work in our congregation. The response to our call for help with Sunday morning hospitality enabled us to create Hospitality Teams, providing vibrant coffee hours in Dobkin Hall bringing members, friends and visitors together in conversation. However, coffee hour is just one place where the *Power of We* is evident. 


